## CONCLUSION

When Orwell died in 1950, V.S. Pritchette, a modern English writer called him, 'the Conscience of his generation'. The title is a little grand but not inappropriate. In most of his work, Orwell's interest was political, social and cultural rather than simply literary. What most people feel on reading his work is the impact of a moral force, a moral force that is strong and sincere. He wrote novels, documentary pieces, autobiographical accounts and essays; these works, in parts or as wholes, have proved Orwell a man of honesty, a man who devoted his life to the principles of decency, liberty and justice, who felt it necessary at times to reject his normal standard of living in order to identify himself with the poor and the oppressed, with the unfortunate and the unhappy.

The political novels under discussion may be weak in characterization, plot and other techniques. The sincerity of their message cannot, however, be doubted. Even if totalitarianism disappears from the world as a serious threat, Orwell's political novels will still be read. For man will always love power, and power will always be as corrupting as it has been in the past. The world of 1984 may no longer be even considered as a possibility; yet Orwell's accQunt of the behaviour of O'Brien and the power-mad Inner Party members

will still be relevant in the world of the future.

Animal Farm seems already to have established its place as a small classic. It is so skillfully constructed and cleverly written that the question of the relevance of its message is itself irrelevant. It may not have the literary stature of <u>Gulliver's Travels</u> but it is in the same satiric strain.

Homage to Catalonia will always be worth reading as an interesting, well written piece of autobiography, a credible account of conditions in the Republican front lines during the Spanish Civil War.

Burmese Days will have the toughest struggle against obscurity or permanent oblivion. It would be sad to see it completely forgotten, for it is undoubtedly Orwell's best novel.

One is forced to admit, in the last analysis that in a sense, Orwell fell between two stools. He had the necessary degree of commitment to make him a very successful political propagandist; at the same time, he had an irresistible fascination for creative writing. Consequently, since he was often unable to separate the two forces (which do not always pull in unison), few of his works have the artistic unity he was striving for. But in view of the success of 1984 and Animal Farm, one should hesitate to conclude that, had Orwell's
